#### 4 Chair's Remarks

The CRD Arts Commission has a vital role to play in sustaining the arts going forward, and helping arts and culture non-profits adapt to the new requirements.

#### 6 Commission Business

#### 6.1 Arts Advisory Council Update: Chair's Report (Verbal)

The Arts Advisory Council did not meet in April. They will meet by electronic means over the next month to address the \$50,000 threshold for Operating grants as requested in November and to adjudicate the Equity, Incubator, and IDEA grants.

#### 6.2 Adoption of 2020-2023 Arts Strategic Plan

J Lam presented the Strategic Plan for review and comment, with the goal for it to be amended as required for eventual adoption and then taken to the Board in fulfillment of Board Initiative 12b-2.

He noted the revised vision from "The arts are central to life in our communities" to "The arts are central to life in the region" and the updated Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations, Results (SOAR) analysis. He also noted the updated evaluation framework that links each goal to priorities, outcomes and progress measures.

In discussion, the Commission expressed the desire to ensure that information related to Goal 2 on page 10 captures the board initiative to explore 100% participation in the arts function. This was seen to include not only pursuing funding participation by all CRD jurisdictions but also in bringing all CRD arts functions, including arts facilities, under a single CRD service umbrella.

#### 2. Introductions

Current member's biographies were previously distributed for the benefit of new members. New appointees B. Crook and A. Hershberg gave brief introductions.

#### 3. Minutes:

#### 6. 2020 IDEA Grant Recommendations

Heinz, Chair of the adjudication committee, noted the discussion went smoothly as committee members were well prepared, and that the recommendations are a reflection of the relative merits of each application as determined through scoring and a discussion of the applications. J. Lam commented that comments are provided in the recommendation notes.

After questions and discussion, it was,

**MOVED** by P. Sullivan, **SECONDED** by B. McLean, that the Arts Advisory Council approve \$38,000 in 2020 March IDEA Grant recommendations as presented and forward them to the Arts Commission for approval.

#### 7. 2020 Equity and Incubator Grant Recommendations

J. Lam spoke to the **Equity Grant** staff report, noting the third year extension of the program. He provided an overview of the program and process and the addition of a community-based adjudicator. Total recommendations were \$9000. In response to a question, J. Lam noted that through an Arts Commission motion, unspent funds could, if necessary, be reallocated to the IDEA grant program.

# REPORT TO ARTS COMMISSION MEETING OF WEDNESDAY, MAY 27, 2020

#### **SUBJECT** Arts Implementation Plan Update

#### **ISSUE SUMMARY**

This report describes the latest promotion and monitoring activities to advance the Capital Regional District (CRD) Arts & Culture Building Our Arts Future Together Implementation Plan.

#### **BACKGROUND**

As the directive of the Provincial Health Officer to maintain social distancing continues, most of the arts organizations funded by the CRD are experiencing significant changes in organizational needs and programming. In response, Arts & Culture increased digital outreach by:

- Posting resources and relief opportunities online for professional arts.
- Compiling lists of alternative arts and culture programming for the public, for example, an arts listing of family activities by grantees (Appendix A).
- Promoting arts and culture through social media and professional networks. Grant advertising and public art promotion gain the highest reach across Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. In May Instagram surpassed Facebook popularity, with over 700 followers.
- Convening the inter-municipal cultural planning Roundtable every second week, in virtual format, since March 22nd. Municipal staff attend electronically and share information about their communities.

Staff conducted initial tracking of the impact of social distancing on arts organizations through email and received a range of response plans based on different business models. Some organizations, such as the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria and "arc.hive", re-opened with modified policies and procedures, while others cancelled their programming seasons. A formal survey for grantee organizations is underway. The CRD Arts & Culture Support Service is a subject matter expert for the 2019 Vital Signs report for the fourteenth year. The report will focus on COVID-19 impacts. Staff foresee monitoring becoming a prominent activity from June to August.

The CRD Arts & Culture Support Service staff are adjusting convening, promotions and monitoring activities during the pandemic with a growing focus on impact tracking placing celebratory activities on hold.

The CRD Arts & Culture Support Service provides support and promotion of the arts sector responsive to the current State of Provincial Emergency and is advancing the Arts Future Together Implementation Plan.

# A Vision for the CRD Arts & Culture Support Service

The Arts & Culture Support Service is a division of the CRD and its activities support the CRD mission: *We are diverse communities working together to serve the public good and build a vibrant, livable and sustainable region, through an effective, efficient and open organization;* and vision: *Our communities strive to achieve exemplary environmental stewardship, a dynamic, vibrant economy and an inclusive, caring society. Regional cooperation, mutually beneficial decision making and advancing shared interests shape the essence of the CRD.* 

Strategic planning session participants revisited the Arts Service vision and mission statements and agreed to continue with the current mission statement, and to update the vision statement:

Our Mission: The CRD supports, promotes and celebrates the arts.

Our Vision: The arts are central to life in the region.

# The CRD Arts & Culture Support Service

CRD Bylaw 2884 established the Arts & Culture Support Service (Arts Service) in June 2001 for "the provision of assistance in relation to the arts and culture for the purpose of benefiting the community or an aspect of the community." Bylaw 2884 also gives authority to the Arts Service's political oversight body, the Arts Commission (AC).

The Arts Commission is appointed annually by the CRD Board and consists of one elected official from each jurisdiction that is a member of the Arts Service. The Arts Commission sets an annual budget to support policies and programs pursuant to its governing bylaw.

CRD Bylaw 2973 established the Arts Advisory Council (AAC) "for an independent community-based body to provide advice to the CRD" on matters relating to the Arts Service. The AAC's mandate is to act as an arm's length adjudication body for Arts Service

funding programs and to advise the Arts Commission on policies that foster and promote:

- Support of the arts in the region,
- Public awareness of and involvement in the arts,
- The creation, exhibition and performance of artistic works, and
- The development of artistic and other requisite skills, and shall advise the CRD Arts Commission of measures which the Council considers to be conducive to these ends.
- Other appropriate duties as assigned by the Arts
   Commission from time to time.

The Arts Service has five grant programs:

- 1. **Operating Grants** provide annual and multi-year financial support to organizations for ongoing annual operations,
- 2. **Project Grants** support one-time events, short series or extended project-based programming,

- 3. **Equity Grants** support arts initiatives by applicants from communities that are at-risk of exclusion or have difficulty accessing support for systemic reasons.
- 4. **Incubator Grants** support development or capacity building for emerging or developing organizations
- 5. **IDEA** (Innovate, Develop, Experiment, Access) **Grants** support arts-based programming by non-arts mandated organizations.

In broad terms, the Operating Grant program is designed to support larger organizations for annual operations while the other grant programs support project-based events or series of events produced by smaller organizations.

#### The Arts Service also:

 Manages landmarkspublicart.ca, a searchable website dedicated to the presentation of public art in the region for jurisdictions participating in the Arts Service  Provides outreach and communications activities, produces an annual Progress Report, a bi-annual Arts Summit, and hosts a community of practice roundtable for municipal staff responsible for arts and culture activities in the region.

Arts Service staff consist of a full-time manager, a full-time community outreach coordinator and a 0.8 FTE administrative assistant. They are responsible for the reporting, analysis and administration of the funding programs and outreach activities. They also provide support to the AC and AAC, and liaise with other levels of government, NGOs and the public in providing information and representing the Arts Service.

Members of the AC, AAC and staff create a strategic plan for the purpose of defining the Arts Service's vision, mission, goals and strategic priorities. This report updates the 2015-2019 plan and is the result of a planning session held in February 2020. A list of the participants is appended.

# **Situational Analysis**

To analyze the Arts Service's current state, strategic planning session participants reviewed the situation analysis created in 2015, and engaged in an appreciative inquiry exercise to identify current strengths, opportunities, aspirations and results to guide the updated strategic plan. A "SOAR" framework was completed, and key risks/threats were noted in a Risk Register\*.

# REPORT TO THE ARTS COMMISSION MEETING OF WEDNESDAY, MAY 27, 2020

#### **SUBJECT** March 2020 Equity Grant Recommendations

#### <u>ISSUE</u>

The March 2020 Equity Grant recommendations are presented for Arts Commission review and approval.

#### **BACKGROUND**

March 2020 was the third, extended pilot year for Equity Grants. Equity Grants are intended to support applicants that face systemic barriers to accessing support through other CRD Arts and Culture Service funding programs. Equity Grants are unique among CRD funding programs as it allows a not-for-profit society to function as a "Sponsor Society" on behalf of an Equity applicant that is not itself a society.

Total requests were \$19,000 on cash budgets totaling \$31,810. The same jury, comprised of two Arts Advisory Council members and a member from the arts community, assessed both Equity and Incubator Grants. The Equity Grant program received four applications. This compares to six applications received in the previous year and four in the first year of the program.

Applications were assessed using a scoring matrix that reflected the desired outcomes of the program related to:

- The identified group or organization leading the project
- The thoroughness of the project description
- The benefits and impacts for the group, their community and the regional community
- An understanding of the intended audience
- Partnerships or collaborations
- The clarity of the proposed budget

Jurors' scores are compiled and averaged resulting in a comparative assessment of each organization's proposal. "Outlier" scores were reconciled each application was discussed to ensure its final score was an accurate reflection of the information provided. The jury's recommendations were then considered by the Arts Advisory Council in a plenary discussion following which they were ratified for the consideration of the Arts Commission.

Two applications scored at or above the satisfactory level and are recommended for funding. Two applications scored below the 50% level and are not recommended for support.

An application receiving a score of less than 50% is difficult to support. It broadly reflects an application that has failed to provide sufficient and clear information on what is being proposed and the activities that will take place making it difficult to determine if the project will achieve the intended goals of the program.

# **IMPLICATIONS**

#### Financial Implications

\$25,000 was available for Equity Grants. A total of \$9,000 in Equity funding is recommended. The unspent funds were moved to augment funding in the IDEA grant program as approved by the Arts Commission at their meeting of April 22, 2020.

# **CONCLUSION**

Two applications, or 50% of applicants are recommended for funding for the full amount of their request. Two other applications are not recommended for funding due to insufficient information provided in their applications.

# **RECOMMENDATION**

That the Arts Commission approve \$9,000 in March 2020 Equity Grant recommendations as presented.

# Previous Project Lead Funding: 2018, \$5000

#### Project Lead(s)

The InterdepenDance Collective, a group of dance artists who experience disability, mental health challenges, and other barriers in the arts in the CRD; Joanne Cuffe (project coordinator); Broken Rhythms Dance and Dyana Sonik-Henderson (project administrator);

The InterdepenDance Collective is passionate about access, equity and disability leadership in the arts in the CRD. We are a peer group of artists who are active in cross-disability and interabled dance in the ancestral land of the Ləkwəŋən and WSÁNEĆ peoples. We experience disability in relation to physical, mobility, sensory, neurological, cognitive, mental health, and learning capabilities. Recent events that we have organized are an Integrated Dance Forum and film event to raise local awareness of mixed-ability dance, and workshops on inclusive choreography and cross-disability dance with visiting teachers.

Broken Rhythms is a Victoria-based, registered not-for-profit dance company founded in 2011 under the artistic direction of Dyana Sonik-Henderson. Broken Rhythms works with many local companies and schools to create original works, accessible art and a vibrant community. Joanne Cuffe is a dance artist and event organizer who facilitates programs and projects full time and has invisible disabilities. They lead all abilities dance programs in the homelands of the Ləkwəŋən and WSÁNEĆ peoples, with 200 dancers in the CRD. Joanne has trained in dance for 25+ years, has a Master's of Education in community leadership, is a professional member of the Canadian Alliance of Dance Artists – West Chapter, and has been co-facilitating collective projects for 22 years.

#### **Project Description**

We are wondering where in Victoria in Lkwungen Homelands, is it possible for our dance collective to: actually get into the building

get on stage and have space to move around,

use a washroom backstage,

have at least 10 friends who are wheelchair users be in the audience and have access to a gender-inclusive audience washroom?

Main activities:

- 1) June-December 2020: research and create resources
- a) a collaborative document for artists about local stages and performance venues' physical access basics;
- b) a report for arts organizations and local governments with examples of barrier-free stages and accessible venues in other cities.
- 2) March 2021: go "on tour" to the local stages that InterdepenDance artists are most excited about
- a) invite venues to provide the collective with a tour of their venue,
- b) followed by an hour on stage with lighting (if we can actually get on stage), for the group to have a dance photoshoot.
- 3. April 2021: host a celebration for International Dance Day:

- a) share what has been learned,
- b) and hold a dance party, with social distance, at a venue that is a viable option for future InterdepenDance Collective performances.
- 4. May-June 2021: Create a photo installation of the tour, and have the photos go on tour to arts organizations, including to locations that are not physically accessible.

#### Comments on the recommendation

The assessment of this proposal was below the satisfactory level. The information contained in it provided insufficient detail to determine the focus of the project and the expected outcomes. Greater clarity was required to distinguish it from a simple accessibility audit that would be documented photographically.

# Previous Project Lead Funding: New

#### Project Lead(s)

Chronically Queer Embroidery Workshops will be a series of open studio workshops focusing on bringing individuals from the LGBTQ2+ and/or disabled communities.

Regan Shrumm will be the artist teaching the workshops. Shrumm is a queer and disabled artist, who has been embroidering since she was ten years old. She has had the opportunity to teach embroidery through the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria and through the Cedar Hill Recreation Centre, but has also facilitated other artistic workshops through Open Space, the Salt Spring Arts Council, the University of Victoria, and the Museum of Northwest Art in Washington State. She has been a part of the online Victoria-based group, Queer Stitch-Craft for the past year, which creates a community network to promote embroidery and other textile arts amongst queer artists.

The Chronically Queer Embroidery Workshops will begin in conjunction with Shrumm's first solo exhibition at the fifty-fifty arts collective, Trade Show. This social practice exhibition focuses on DIY, queer, and non-capitalist ways of sharing. Trade Show will start with a series of Shrumm's artworks, mostly embroidered textiles on display. Visitors to the gallery can take home as many of these items that they would like, but they need to leave something they feel is of the same value to what they took. By at first holding the workshops in relation to the exhibition, Shrumm hopes to inspire artists in the LGBTQ2+ and disabled communities to think through entrepreneurial ways of displaying and selling their art.

If COVID-19 is still underway, Shrumm can also complete the workshops via the video conferencing Zoom.

#### **Project Description**

Chronically Queer Embroidery Workshops will focus on teaching embroidery skills to those identifying from the LGBTQ2+ and/or disabled community. Shrumm will build in lesson plans to teach both basic and advance stitches and create projects such as badges, adding embellishments to clothing, and combining painting with embroidery. During the workshops, participants will have access to free embroidery supplies so that for those who already know how to embroider, they can use the time to be creative, meet other artists, and collaborate on group projects. The workshops will be held twice a month for four months. If the workshops prove to be popular, Shrumm will look for other streams of revenue to continue the workshops into the fall and winter.

Textiles in general have had a long history as a particularly queer artistic medium due to its campness, subculture, and the association of a feminine culture. There has been a more recent revival of queer embroidery due to artists such as Mary Tremonte and Oliva Mew. Both of these artists are reclaiming and reimagine embroidery in its relationship to gender as well as thinking through general power connotation. Tremonte, Mew, and hundreds of other queer artists are particularly using embroidery to express their disabilities. While this type of exploration of queerness and disability is occurring in isolation in Victoria, it would be impactful if the individuals connected into a group.

- ASL interpreters and other language interpreters (if requested at least two weeks in advance)
- Transcribers (if requested at least two weeks in advance)

- Large print instructions
- Scent-reduced space
- street level accessibility
- Gender-neutral bathrooms that include a chair lift and baby changing area
  I can also complete the workshops via Zoom to include the accessibility features of:
- Captioning
- Transcription
- ASL interpreters and other language interpreters
- Mailing out art supplies to participants for each workshop

Because accessibility accommodations can be expensive, they are often not done in the Victoria-based arts programming. By having the CRD's financial support through an Equity grant, accessibility will be the number one priority for these workshops.

#### Comments on the recommendation

This application received the highest score of all applications received. The information was clear, the project description is focused, and there were strong links established to the target communities as well as a historical context that form the basis of the activities. There is some question about how many participants can be managed but this will depend on the level of disability on the part of participants.

#### Project Lead(s)

My name is John Aitken and I am the creator of the concept and the project lead for an art installation and community dialogue work titled "Walking Art Installation" I am also the organizer for the Southern Gulf Island's ReDress (red dress) Events. I am an actor, carver, filmmaker, photographer, and educator, and identify as a two-spirit, Indigenous person with mixed ancestry of Coast Salish, Haida and Scottish lineage. I have been living in and working with the Mayne Island community for 15 years and grew up on Mayne Island. I moved away when I was eighteen years old.

The communities who will be directly impacted by this project are, Mayne Island, Pender Island and Galiano Island.

#### **Project Description**

This project is a continuation of the Southern Gulf Islands ReDress project, inspired by Manitoba Metis Artist Jaime Black which John has been following since 2015. The Southern Gulf Islands Red Dress Events was begun as a way to heighten awareness on the disproportionate number of Indigenous women, girls, trans and two-spirit individuals that go missing or have been killed across Canada. ReDress refers both to the Red dresses hung as a nonconfrontational way of raising awareness of the issue and a subtle play on words bringing the idea of redressing the issues and effects of colonialism on members of the Indigenous communities in Canada.

"Walking Art Installation" refers to the concept of John Aitken walking to pre-booked venues on Mayne, Pender and Galiano Islands in October of 2020. During these walks, John will hang red dresses which he will have collected prior to the projects start date and will carry with him in a backpack. An invitation will be sent out in advance of the walk to interested community members to join him on the walk. They will be invited to bring their own dresses and they will assist him with the hanging of the dresses. A discussion (walk and talk) will be a natural part of this portion of the project. When John arrives at the destination, he will screen the film he created in 2019, "Washed up!". This viewing will act as a provocation piece to continue the conversation begun during the walk. The discussion will be carried out in a "talking circle" and will have a focus of the "why?". Why do so many go missing and are murdered from this specific marginalized group in Canada? One of the outcomes of this discussion is the exploration of what actions we can take to decrease these numbers.

#### Comments on the recommendation

This application was assessed to be above the satisfactory level. Its score reflects a sufficient level of clarity and detail to understand the project and its intended impacts and outcomes. The project has a strong and relevant message that is connected to the local community, has a history of success and has the backing of a respected local arts organization.

Support for some research costs, but mostly printing/digitizing of the book and associated online/website costs.

#### Comments on the recommendation

This application was the lowest ranked proposal. It's score fell below the 50% level making it difficult to support for lack of clarity and specific information about purpose and impact. Especially unclear was why the creation of this book would have such a particular importance for the local community and why it was needed.

#### **SUBJECT** March 2020 Incubator Grant Recommendations

# **ISSUE SUMMARY**

The March 2020 Incubator Grant recommendations are presented for Arts Commission review and approval.

#### **BACKGROUND**

March 2020 was the third year extension of the Incubator Grant two-year pilot. Incubator Grants are intended to enhance sustainability and resiliency in the arts by funding short-term staffing, mentoring, workspace, training or other resources that assist in the acceleration of organizational development or, in the development of new arts projects. They are aimed at emerging or established organizations with an arts mandate.

Total requests were \$10,000 on budgets totaling \$29,000. The same jury, comprised of two Arts Advisory Council members and a member from the arts community, assessed both Equity and Incubator Grants. The Incubator Grant program received two applications. This compares to two applications in the first year, and four in the second.

The jurors assessed each of the Incubator applications using a scoring matrix that reflected the desired outcomes of the program related to:

- The thoroughness of the project description
- Key personnel
- The development of capacity within the organization as a result of the project
- Skills or development for personnel
- The creation of partnerships
- Impacts for the art form and the community
- The clarity of the proposed budget

Jurors' scores are compiled and averaged resulting in a comparative assessment of each organization's proposal. "Outlier" scores were reconciled each application was discussed to ensure its final score was an accurate reflection of the information provided. The jury's recommendations were then considered by the Arts Advisory Council in a plenary discussion following which they were ratified for the consideration of the Arts Commission.

Both applications were recommended for funding having provided clear information in support of developmental initiatives that will fulfill the intent of the program.

#### Who is Leading the Project

The Space Blanket Society (Board of Directors: Kathryn Calder, Musician and Victoria's Artist in Residence; Emily Goodden, Artist and Educator; and Doug Jarvis, Artist, Curator, Administrator, and Sessional Instructor) will be working as an in-kind volunteer board to mentor youth (aged 14 - 24) through the process of establishing and maintaining a youth-led/artist-run collective in downtown Victoria. With the society's support, youth members will be assisted in developing a sustainable working model of an arts space for youth to meet, make, curate, exhibit, and perform.

#### **Project Description**

We are seeking start-up funding to obtain a centralized workspace in downtown Victoria. This workspace will be a gathering place for creative youth to develop arts programming and to initiate community art activities. Grant money will be allocated to paying for rent so that we have a space to grow our operations, fundraise, and begin outreach activities.

#### **Comments on Recommendation**

New applicant. The application scored above the satisfactory level providing a good description of the intended project and plan which focussed on a youth-directed artist-run centre. As a start up there is some uncertainty around sustainability however this was considered to be an inherent risk with the program. There is a significant level of confirmed in-kind support for materials, equipment and mentorship, with CRD funding providing 21% of cash support.

#### **Project Description**

Starry Starry Skies seeks support for mentorship with Theatre SKAM. This project formalizes ad hoc mentorship that has taken place between the two leaders of each company. We seek to bring the core members of Starry Starry Skies together with Theatre SKAM core staff. As well, our members will work alongside project staff, both artistic and administrative, as Theatre SKAM realizes a workshop production of a new professional musical, Tragic Animal Stories.

Five artists from our company will work part-time for a period of three months in the planning of the project, and then for one week full-time for the execution of the workshop.

The project builds upon the existing relationship between our companies, providing continued mentorship for our core team, while propelling the careers of our administrators and artists. The project generates employment opportunities for our company members who will participate in the planning of rehearsals, scheduling of production work, and the collective creation of a new musical.

Tragic Animal Stories tells the story of Cowguy, whose sense of isolation and his overwhelming need for love and acceptance come from a sense of being an outcast because of his mixed lineage. He belongs both to the human race and to the animal kingdom, yet neither group really knows how to accept him. Until he meets Fishman. This play explores the impossibility of inter-species love in all its surreal, absurd and moving glory. Love, and our ideas and projections surrounding those we love, can carry us through many things, but ultimately reality will set in and point out the impossible.

#### **Comments on Recommendation**

New applicant. This application scored above the satisfactory level and provided sufficient information to provide a clear understanding of the project and intended outcomes. There is a strong mentoring from an experienced company as well as a history of success with previous productions. The project lead has a strong background and the proposal will pay emerging artists.

#### **SUBJECT** March 2020 IDEA Grant Recommendations

#### **ISSUE SUMMARY**

The March 2020 IDEA (Innovate, Develop, Experiment, Access) Grant recommendations are presented for Arts Commission review and approval.

# **BACKGROUND**

The IDEA Grant program supports and encourages initiatives in the arts by non-arts mandated organizations (all other Arts Service programs are focused on organizations with arts as the central purpose). Eighteen applications were received at the March deadline and were assessed by a jury that met via videoconference.

A four member jury of Arts Advisory Council members assessed 18 applications. Thirteen applicants were returning applicants, twelve of which had received previous funding. Five applicants were new to the program. Final Reports from previously funded projects were reviewed where applicable.

A total of \$53,000 in requests was received on cash budgets totaling \$403,605. The budget for IDEA grants was \$30,000 however unspent funds from the Equity and Incubator programs were reallocated for use if necessary.

The jury assessed each of the applications using a scoring matrix that reflected the desired outcomes of the program related to:

- The thoroughness of the project description
- An understanding of how the need for the project was determined
- Key personnel
- Fulfillment of one or more of the goals of the IDEA program
- Knowledge of the target audience
- The clarity of the proposed budget

Jurors' scores are compiled and averaged resulting in a comparative assessment of each organization's proposal. "Outlier" scores were reconciled each application was discussed to ensure its final score was an accurate reflection of the information provided. The jury's recommendations were then considered by the Arts Advisory Council in a plenary discussion following which they were ratified for the consideration of the Arts Commission.

Thirteen applications that scored at or above the satisfactory level are recommended for funding. Five applications scored below the 50% level and are not recommended for support.

An application receiving a score of less than 50% is difficult to support. It broadly reflects an application that has failed to provide sufficient and clear information on what is being proposed

and the activities that will take place making it difficult to determine if the project will achieve the intended goals of the program.

# **IMPLICATIONS**

### Financial Implications

A total of \$53,000 in requests was received for proposals with cash budgets totaling \$403,605. The Advisory Council recommends total funding of \$38,000 to 13 organizations. This would fully allocate the 2020 IDEA Grant budget in addition to \$8000 reallocated from unspent funds from the Incubator program.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Thirteen applications, or 72% of applicants are recommended for funding for the full amount of their request. Five applicants are not recommended for funding due to less than complete information in their applications.

That the Arts Commission approve \$38,000 in 2020 March IDEA Grant recommendations as presented.

#### **Organization Mandate:**

Our mission is to empower youth in grades K-12 through artistic education, collaboration and expression, and through volunteerism and community service. By engaging youth in pro-social activities focused on the fine arts we aim to encourage positive youth development that may aid in the prevention of high-risk problem behaviours and help young people become strong, confident individuals.

#### **Project description**

Amber Academy encourages positive youth development by engaging students in pro-social activities through a variety of artistic avenues. Classes include acting, choir, costumes & fashion design, and technical theatre, as well as visual arts such as painting, sculpting, and more. Since launching our after-school program in September 2017 more than 250 students have participated in our classes. However, only a handful of kids beyond grade 8 have participated in our program.

After speaking with our older students and other teens in our community, we have heard from the youth that kids in this particular age are more likely to attend weekend program activities over after-school weekday activities because of homework and school-related commitments during the week.

We are requesting funding to allow us to expand our current program to include a weekend theatre class specifically for students in grades 8 and up. We have already spoken with our active students who are currently in grades 7 & 8 to gauge their interest in our idea and we have received very positive feedback. Currently, these students attend acting classes with students in grades 6+. The teens we spoke with were very excited about the idea of having a program of their own and feel strongly that a class specifically for teens would draw a number of other kids who enjoy acting but don't want to attend classes with younger children.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This application scored above the satisfactory level providing clear information on the purpose and impact of the proposed activities on its target audience. The successful implementation of the project assumes the resumption of school in the fall of 2020.

#### **Organization Mandate:**

Held over eight sessions, participants will explore inclusive dance concepts and group improvisation while delving into different approaches to creating dance as an ensemble. The program is geared towards adults (ages 18 to 90+) of all abilities, disabilities, backgrounds, genders, and levels of experience with dance.

The Burnside Gorge Community Association has a strong reputation for providing innovative and accessible programming to meet community need. There are currently no accessible dance programs available in the Burnside Gorge neighbourhood or the surrounding areas. BGCA also provides a continuum of programming for all ages and stages of life. Many of the people served through BGCA face barriers related to finances as well as physical and/or mental health. There is a need for programs that help to instill a sense of inclusion and connectedness within the community.

#### **Comments on the Recommendation**

This new applicant scored well above the satisfactory level. It provided clear information on the purpose and impact of the proposed activities on its target audience, demonstrated a high level of demographic inclusivity reflective of the neighbourhood context, and provided an alternate implementation should COVID19 remain an issue at the project's commencement in the fall of 2020.

#### **Organization Mandate:**

The Congregation Emanu-El of Victoria, Vancouver Island" came into being in 1862; members purchased the present site of the synagogue just after that. The cornerstone-laying ceremony took place June 2, 1863. This was a gala celebration and was attended by the mayor, town council, Chief Justice, the Freemasons, Hebrew Benevolent, French Benevolent and St. Andrews Societies, bands and choirs. The synagogue today is the oldest house of worship in British Columbia, and the oldest synagogue in continuous use in Canada.

Since its founding the has been committed to uniting the Jewish community and the larger community in Victoria. It has a strong tradition of education not only for the members of the congregation but also to educating the great population to the stories from Jewish history and traditions. Bema production has been an active part of this interaction since its founding in 2014 bring theatrical production to Victoria audiences with a Jewish perspective and often addresses issues relevant to the experiences of the Jewish community which often speak to larger global issue such as Racism, Hate Crimes, 'otherness', and social justice.

# **Project description**

Survivors is a Pilot Project to bring a professional theatrical performance about the experience of Jewish Youth during the Holocaust for Middle and High Schools in the Greater Victoria region. Directed by Zelda Dean the show will feature local theatre professionals including actors, creative team and administration. Survivors would be presented in the fall of 2020 with up to 10 shows at schools predominantly in the CRD municipalities.

Inspired by the Lives and Words of Ten Holocaust Survivors it is a cautionary tale about the risks of normalized hate. This inspirational and uplifting play ensures that the voices of Survivors will never be silenced. Zelda, director and founder of Bema Productions began working to bring this play to local schools. After meeting with Minister of Education Rob Fleming to endorse the project, it was apparent that this is an important project not only for Artistic elements but also for the social and educational content so needed during times of rising hate-crimes around the world and across our digital landscape. Live theatre provides valuable experiences in empathy and an understanding of history within a larger context.

There are few Professional theatre companies bringing this demographic programming especially created locally. Also, through the interaction with the Ministry of Education, it is clear that the topic of the Holocaust has limited Arts-based content available to schools. This Pilot would offer this play and content at no cost to audiences.

Survivors would test the feasibility of future touring programs for this age group regionally and possibly provincially. Zelda and Bema working with oversight and guidance from Congregation Emanu-El Synagogue is the only local or provincial organization presenting theatre with strong ties to the Jewish Community that can offer this content in a culturally respectful and safe context.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This application was the highest scoring application It will develop a new theatrical presentation focused on youth both as subject matter and audience. The need for the project was well described and the organization has a track record of successful production and presentation. It provided clear information on the purpose and impact of the proposed activities on its target audience.

- 3. To organize and/or be involved in events and projects that promote the preservation of healthy environments.
- 4. To use Creative Arts to educate and encourage the public to be more conscientious and aware of their lifestyle choices and their impacts on the environment and to promote and encourage sustainable ways of living.
- 5, To use Creative Arts to educate and encourage the business sector, corporations and all levels of government to make more sustainable choices in their daily business practices.
- 6. To use Creative Arts to increase public awareness of environmental and social non-governmental organizations
- 7. To be an example of a sustainable organization, ie: to recycle; to use recycled and post-consumer products; to compost; to use energy-efficient methods of transportation and communication.

#### **Project description**

We are living in a time unlike any other. The COVID 19 pandemic is fundmentally changing how communities will adapt to a global health threat. Climate change is also a health crisis due to increased contamination of air and waters; spread of disease driven by the changing climate; potential clashes between closing borders and the need for people to migrate to safer havens. We are living through the early stages of climate change. This pandemic is teaching us the vital importance of early actions to mitigate its potential impacts on our health, social and economic systems.

In times of crises, public policy must be driven by science and evidence. Scientists are telling us that we have both to reduce our carbon footprints and adapt to changing climates by designing more resilient ecosystems. Actions to control future pandemics are identical to lowering our carbon footprints: less travel; more working from home; more use of local goods and services; more compassion and a greater sense of community. We need to start considering how we adapt on a personal, emotional and spiritual level.

We plan to align performances in the creative arts with telling stories of how audiences can change their behaviour to live healthy, meaningful, and even joyful lives with a lighter carbon footprint. We will encourage our audiences to consider making pledges to continue the new ways of living learnt as a result of the pandemic that align with climate change.

We will do so through a series of special performances, starting Nov. 22, 2020 in partnership with the Victoria Philharmonic Choir and professional orchestra presenting Handel's *Dixit Dominus*. We will be working with three teenage students who are currently being trained to present educational and inspirational stories during the performance.

#### **Comments on the Recommendation**

This application scored well below the 50% level in overall assessment. The application did not provide sufficient information enabled the jurors to fully understand the connection between the primary activities and the anticipated outcomes.

#### **Organization Mandate:**

To support the restoration and enhancement of Bowker Creek and its watershed to a healthy state, guided by the vision and goals of the Bowker Creek Blueprint.

#### Project description

The project features a series of three Creekside Concerts, which will take place in various public spaces along Bowker Creek. The creek begins on the campus of the University of Victoria and runs through eleven different neighbourhoods and three CRD municipalities before emptying into the Salish Sea. Each concert will be free and open to the public and will feature performances by a local poet and musicians (amplified by a bicycle-powered sound system) as well as interactive visual art activities that attendees of all ages can participate in. This year we will host the concerts in different public spaces from last year, with one concert taking place in Oak Bay and two in Saanich.

After producing a very successful Creekside Concerts series during the summer of 2019, we are excited to continue to address the major lack of awareness that most residents of the CRD have of Bowker Creek. More than 60% of the waterway is covered over and many of the segments that are above ground are fenced off and hidden from view. We have found that music, poetry and visual art are excellent tools for bringing Bowker Creek into the consciousness of those who have never noticed it, and also to create an expanded awareness of the watershed in people who do know about it.

We received a large amount of positive feedback from residents who attended the series in 2019 and the warm reception that we experienced reinforced that using the arts to pursue our mandate and to reach a new and wider audience is an effective strategy.

We are excited that Brianna Bear from Songhees Nation has expressed interest in attending the series this year to welcome attendees to Lekwungen Territory and to share about Lekwungen people's relationship to the land and water.

#### **Comments on the Recommendation**

This application was one of the highest scoring proposals. Its purpose was well defined and its geographic scope spans two municipalities which is expected to attract audience from across the region.

#### **Project description**

Harmony Project Society of British Columbia (Harmony Project Sooke) provides out-of-school arts and culture activities in the form of music instruction and performance opportunities for children and youth in the Sooke region; particularly those from underserved families. Modelled after and recognized by the Los Angeles Harmony Project, three professional musicians/music educators from the Sooke Philharmonic Society founded the program after a needs assessment revealed that almost 30% of the Sooke population were living below the poverty line; that many children raised in low-income households had little support for academic achievement; that they lacked the financial resources for private music education; and, that there was a shortage of music programming in Sooke Region schools. Begun in 2016 as one String class and one Drumline class, it expanded to two classes each in 2018. In 2019, in response to community demand, and with the support of the CRD Ideas Grant and other grants, Harmony Project Sooke was able to add a third Strings class and expand the Drumline corps.

Harmony Project Sooke is requesting support for the continuation of the program expansion it began last year. Every student who commits to Strings or Drumline lessons with HPS commits to a minimum of two years of classes. The Board likewise, commits to sustaining students and often, to subsidizing the tuition of students for those two years The current enrollment is forty-five students, up from thirty-six in 2018: ten in each of three HPS Strings classes and fifteen in the three-level Drumline class.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This application was clear in its intent and purpose and provided enough information that its assessment was above the satisfactory level. The music focused project is aimed at underserved children with particular outreach to first Nations and low income. The recommendation of an IDEA grant provides support for a small portion of the overall budget.



As an artist and art educator I have witnessed the unique transformations in community that can be facilitated by creative endeavors. I have also seen personal transformations through art exercises because the creative process is conducive to integrating information and finding personal relevance and emotional meaningfulness of information. Both of these organizations have clients who are vulnerable to discrimination and would greatly benefit from discovering / bolstering their leadership potential.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This new applicant scored below the overall 50% level of assessment and did not provide clear information or specific detail for the jurors to understand exactly what the activities were that were being proposed.

#### **Project description**

The Jewish Community Centre of Victoria has sponsored a Jewish film festival since 2015. The Victoria International Jewish Film Festival (VIJFF) offers unique Jewish-themed movies in Greater Victoria theatres. We plan to screen eight to ten movies over four days in November, 2020. We screen them in Victoria at downtown Vic Theatre venue. The aim of the VIJFF is to enhance the capacity to enjoy films not just as a social event but as a cultural and education expression of universal themes. It aims to encourage a discriminating and intelligent attitude towards films as a medium of education and information.

As well, for the first time, we plan to host a free program launch event in October 2020 in order to show trailers of Jewish film festival choices, honour/highlight the donors and supporters, provide entertainment for families, and promote the film festival.

We see our film festival as an important agent of outreach in order to normalize the presence of the Jewish community in Greater Victoria and to highlight its contributions to the health, (in its broadest sense) arts and culture of the community.

B'Nai Brith Canada's "Annual Audit of Antisemitic Incidences, 2018" found that there was a 126.7% increase in anti-Semitic events(374) in British Columbia in 2018 compared to 2017. These uncertain times, with increased antisemitism throughout the world including Victoria, it is important to mount events that bring our broad Jewish community together for shared and supported experiences. In addition, we welcome the broader community to celebrate creative and independent Jewish-themed films from around the world.

Our VIJFF has proven over the last five years that it fulfills that important need.

#### **Comments on the Recommendation**

This application was rated well above the satisfactory level and overall assessment. The purpose of the project was clear and the underlying reasons for its development were backed up by statistics and specific information. The organization has a history of past success backed up by a supportive infrastructure.

Our approach is to partner with South Pacific and local Indigenous peoples to make connections, support their goals, and educate the public on issues facing Pacific Indigenous peoples. We have worked as a guest on Lekwungen Territories in Victoria, BC for the past 45 years, collaborating with diverse local and international organizations, cultural leaders, artists, and educators on Indigenous knowledge exchanges, educational initiatives, art shows, and festivals.

#### Project description

One Wave Gathering is a multifaceted, award-winning annual gathering celebrating the arts and cultures of Indigenous peoples of Canada and the South Pacific Islands. Since 2008, One Wave events have served to advance understanding, dialogue, and respect for the cultures, arts, and experiences of Pacific Indigenous peoples. This yearly, multi-week gathering provides a welcoming, accessible, and creative space for our diverse local citizenry to engage with topics relevant to Pacific communities, including ecological stewardship, cultural preservation, and Indigenous rights. Pacific Peoples' Partnership collaborates on the design of this annual series of events with many long-standing local partners, elders, activists, artists, and community leaders. We work closely with local Esquimalt, Songhees, and South Pacific facilitators to guide cultural programming and protocols. Increasing public knowledge of local Indigenous teachings, culture, history, and lands is integral to the project.

Past years have included visual art showings, digital media and film screenings, educational talks, dance, and cultural presentations. One Wave Gathering has grown into an important event for the South Pacific diaspora and for local Indigenous people. Indigenous artists and participants have shared feedback that they love this event and see it as a safe and inspiring program to engage in building understanding, as we showcase and celebrate Pacific and Indigenous arts and cultures. We have fielded inquiries in recent years around organizing a whole bus for Native Friendship Centre members, we hosted a guest visit last year by Maori actress Rena Owens. We centre youth within the programming and are planning an Indigenous youth film element in partnership with MediaNet Flux Gallery.

We are committed to a process of in-depth community consultation that guides all events and programming. For example, we changed the name of our event in 2017 from One Wave Festival to One Wave Gathering as guided by Songhees Elder Skip Dick. He helped to reshape this from "entertainment" to what is now an award-winning Pacific celebration and gathering of friends and cousins. Last year, we also added a cultural ambassador component that we hope to build on this year, where local Indigenous leaders facilitated different spaces during the gathering for cultural sharing and learning opportunities for members of the public. We continue to maintain close contact with local Indigenous advisors and gather testimonials after each One Wave Gathering to ensure relevance, value, and accessibility of activities. We also plan to conduct surveys at this year's event to collect participants' input.

#### **Comments on the Recommendation**

This organization has been previously funded for its successful annual event. The projected program and activities are clearly stated. The overall application received a higher than satisfactory assessment. The event is scheduled for September 2020 and the proposal noted the development of alternative plans in the event of ongoing COVID19 issues related to public gatherings.

What strategies have been developed, how are people finding ways to cope and create, what comes next?

Guest speakers will present a range of creative responses to the pandemic and how arts makers are coping and creating art.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This application received an assessment well below the 50% level. It lacked sufficient information for the jurors to determine that it fulfilled one or more of the purposes of the IDEA grant in terms of its artistic objectives. The project, an online regional conference for arts managers to discuss strategies on coping with COVID19, was not seen as a priority for this grant program.

#### **Project description**

As indicated above our Society has hosted the Tour des Iles Festival over the last 5 years. The Festival takes place on Pender, Saturna, Mayne, Galiano and Salt Spring Islands and has involved multiple events over a 3 day weekend. Our society has organized the transportation of people between islands as well as multiple individual events on these islands.

We are proposing a modified format for the 2020 Tour des Iles Festival.

For the 2020 Tour we will support a touring boat(s) that will bring a local dance band to each of the 5 islands over two days. The new format will be called "Tour Des lles Presents" and we have tentatively contracted with Jack Garton and the Demon Squadron to be the featured performers. They will touch down at appropriate venues on each of the 5 the islands for 3-4 hours. Each island will have a local musician opener plus one musician from a different island that will join them with short sets at venues close to the docks. The 2020 Tour Des lles format will focus on shining a spotlight on Southern Gulf Island Musicians, and provide an avenue to encourage cross-pollination between the island artists. As the boat heads to another island, they will bring one solo artist to the next island to perform. Logistically, we will have one boat to bring the band around for two days, and another smaller one that can bring the roving musicians back home after their show. Jack Garton and Demon Squadron are an upbeat, danceable band, with accordion/trumpet/vocals, drums, bass and guitar. There are a plethora of talented musicians on the Islands who will join the touring group.

#### **Comments on the Recommendation**

This application fell slightly below the overall satisfactory rating but still contain sufficient information to understand the purpose and impact of the proposed activities. It was seen as an interesting community variation on dealing with restrictions on public gatherings, bringing artists communities rather than audience coming to performers. Jurors noted that a funding recommendation assumes that public health requirements will be maintained in transporting artists from island to island and in the production of performances.

We promote the belief that all persons have the right to receive consistent physical, emotional, and spiritual support necessary to maintain individuality and dignity while facing death and bereavement; that those caring for the dying must themselves receive consistent, planned, emotional and spiritual support; and that support for the dying and their families should be provided by a multidisciplinary team of professionals and volunteers.

#### **Project description**

Victoria Hospice is seeking support for our 2020-2021 Music Therapy Bereavement Choirs. This program will bring bereaved family members and caregivers of recently deceased persons together to take part in a series of weekly choral sessions, overseen by our trained music therapist, Kirsten Davis. Music therapy has an established evidence base demonstrating its effectiveness in pain management, supporting patient and family psychosocial needs, and improving quality of life. In addition, studies have shown that bringing bereaved people together in a shared activity helps them to bond and find comfort above and beyond their direct therapeutic benefits. This will also offer beneficial continuity for family members and loved ones who have been interacting with Victoria Hospice, and help introduce our bereavement services to bereaved persons who would not have otherwise known that they could seek counselling and support despite not having had a loved one die at our unit.

Victoria Hospice resumed our landmark music therapy program for palliative care patients last year to tremendous success, due in part to the support of a previous CRD IDEA Grant, and this program would serve to expand and provide the benefits of music therapy to a wider Victoria-based audience.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This organization received a high assessment. Its project description was clear and the project personnel are qualified.

#### **Organization Mandate:**

The purpose of the Society (Victoria Society for Blind Arts & Culture) is to facilitate access to, and participation in, arts and cultural activities and events for persons with vision limitations.

To this end, the Society shall serve blind and low vision individuals in the following ways:

- (a) Facilitate access to information about arts and cultural activities and events;
- (b) Promote participation in creative outlets and opportunities; and
- (c) Provide financial assistance for such participation.

#### **Project description**

One of the Victoria Society for Blind Arts & Culture (VSBAC) projects is the VIP Singers. This is a choir for blind and vision-impaired participants with an average membership of 10 – 12 members. The choir has 32 practices a year between September and June and gives 5-6 free performances a year. A practice room with piano is provided by the James Bay New Horizons, free of charge. Performance venues have included seniors' facilities such as the Renaissance, Beckley Farm Lodge and Parry Place, and public venues such as the James Bay New Horizons and Skampede.

The VIP Singers' director and pianist are also blind. For the past five years, they have provided their services for free. Unlike community choirs, the director and pianist are not paid as most of the choir members are on very low fixed incomes and could not afford the registration fee normally charged to participants in other choirs. A voluntary nominal drop-in fee (\$1 or \$2) is collected each week, which enables the choir to pay a small honorarium (\$50) to the director and pianist twice a year.

For four years the choir was fortunate to have a sighted member who volunteered her services, acting as the choir Manager. This individual left the choir last spring and since that time the choir has been without a Manager, struggling to fill this role as best it can. Several of the managerial tasks including making and distributing practice recordings to choir members and transporting and setting up of amplification equipment at performances require the Manager to have specific skills and capabilities which none of the remaining choir members possess.

In order to continue providing public performances when requested, the VSBAC is seeking funding to pay the choir director and pianist for 15 practices and 5 performances as well as contract a choir manager for 5 practices and 5 performances to take place during the next 12 months.

#### Comments on the Recommendation

This was a new application that scored above the satisfactory level. It provided clear information on the purpose and impact of the proposal on its target audience.

#### **Organization Mandate:**

Victoria Women's Transition House collaborates, advocates and educates to address and prevent intimate partner violence and abuse of women and children through supportive shelter, housing, counselling and other community-based services.

#### **Project description**

Victoria Women's Transition House (VWTH) would like to support the unique needs of older women survivors of intimate partner violence and abuse through collaborating with multidisciplinary artist Marie Specht, ceramics artist Mary Loria, the Arts Centre at Cedar Hill Recreation and a skilled VWTH older women's counsellor. This innovative project is called Healing Through the Arts: Multidisciplinary Arts and Ceramics for Older Women and will operate in two groups: Group #1 will run once-per-week for eight weeks, October 16, 2020 – December 4, 2021 and will focus on visual arts, journaling and poetry and spoken word sessions. Group #2 will run once-per-week for eight weeks, January 22-March 19, 2021 and will focus on ceramics. All sessions will last for two hours (plus prep and clean-up) and each of the sessions will culminate with a Wrap-Up and Celebration on the final, 8th class. With participants' permission, art will be displayed onsite at the Arts Centre at Cedar Hill. We anticipate that this program will impact 16-20 women survivors of intimate partner violence. The program will be evaluated at the conclusion of each of the two eight-week sessions through analysis of group attendance, exit surveys from participants, as well as artist and counsellor feedback.

The Healing Through the Arts: Multidisciplinary Arts and Ceramics for Older Women project will allow VWTH to reach out to older women survivors of abuse—an underserved demographic in Victoria. VWTH clients have advocated for art programs and counsellors have seen significant benefits in delivering arts programming to survivors of intimate partner violence. Facilitators will provide a positive framework and helpful resources to assist participants to discover greater self-expression. Using clay, paint, poetry, storytelling and other artistic mediums, this program will help to build participants' self-esteem, engage them in their community, and increase their awareness of themselves, others and community resources. This will have a significant impact on participants as they use their new skills and confidence to engage with others in shared interests, partake in community-based activities and develop time for quiet, safe reflection as they continue to heal from intimate partnership violence and abuse.

\*\*\*NOTE: Should the COVID-19 outbreak still limit face-to-face interaction, this project can be adapted to online delivery with each session offering group and individual video/ digital support from the VWTH older women's counsellor as well as instruction and artistic guidance from each of the professional artists. Within careful safety guidelines, a package of art materials can be delivered to each participant along with instructions regarding the digital program and times of online delivery. We are still working out the details of this proposed alternative program delivery. However, we continue to be committed to providing support and engagement for each of our participating clients in either an in-person or digital

# **Comments on the Recommendation**

This application scored well above the satisfactory level. It provided clear information on the purpose and impact of the proposed activities on its target audience. Although the project is several months in the future the proposal provided alternative implementation strategies should COVID19 remain an issue.
