REPORT TO ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES COMMITTEE MEETING OF WEDNESDAY, MAY 19, 2021

SUBJECT Amendment to the Hartland Landfill Tipping Fee and Regulation Bylaw (Bylaw No. 3881)

ISSUE SUMMARY

To amend Bylaw No. 3881, the Hartland Landfill Tipping Fee and Regulation Bylaw No. 6, 2013, to adjust the kitchen scraps tipping fee rate.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting of March 10, 2021, the Capital Regional District (CRD) Board approved a motion directing that Bylaw No. 3881, the Hartland Landfill Tipping Fee and Regulation Bylaw No. 6, 2013 be amended to set the tipping fee rate for kitchen scraps at \$140 per tonne beginning January 1, 2022 to offset kitchen scraps hauling and processing costs. The amendment Bylaw No. 4420 can be found as Appendix A.

ALTERNATIVES

Alternative 1

The Environmental Services Committee recommends to the Capital Regional District Board:

- 1. That Bylaw No. 4420, "Hartland Tipping Fee and Regulation Bylaw No. 6, 2013, Amendment Bylaw No. 3, 2021", be introduced and read a first, second time and third time; and
- 2. That Bylaw No. 4420 be adopted.

IMPLICATIONS

Financial Implications

Adjusting the tipping fee for kitchen scraps received at the Hartland landfill transfer station to \$140 per tonne will bring the revenues generated through the provision of this service into alignment with the costs of hauling and processing the material.

Intergovernmental Implications

Kitchen scraps collected by the municipalities of Esquimalt, Sidney and View Royal have historically been managed through CRD kitchen scraps hauling and processing contracts. Increasing the tipping fee for kitchen scraps under Alternative 1 will likely require these municipalities to increase the budgets for their programs, and delaying the increase in the fee

until January 1, 2022 should provide them with sufficient time to do so. Victoria, Oak Bay and Saanich have separate arrangements for the processing of their kitchen scraps.

Environmental Implications

The diversion of kitchen scraps for composting saves landfill space and reduces greenhouse gas emissions by avoiding methane generation as they decompose in the landfill. The finished compost produced from kitchen scraps can also help reduce the use of fossil-fuel based fertilizers when used in agriculture. The higher tipping fee posed under Alternative 1 may serve as a disincentive to divert kitchen scraps. Alternative 2 will help to facilitate the diversion of kitchen scraps by maintaining a subsidized kitchen scraps diversion option to both public and private haulers using the Hartland transfer station.

CONCLUSION

At its meeting of March 10, 2021, the Capital Regional District Board directed that the tipping fee rate for kitchen scraps be set at \$140 per tonne beginning January 1, 2022 to offset kitchen scraps hauling and processing costs. Approving the amendment to Bylaw 3881 will complete this directive and align kitchen scraps hauling and processing costs with the tipping fees levied to receive these materials at Hartland. Having the \$140 per tonne fee begin January 1, 2022 will allow sufficient time for both public and private sector users to adjust their budgets and/or fees in preparation for this change.

RECOMMENDATION

REPORT TO ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES COMMITTEE MEETING OF WEDNESDAY, MAY 19, 2021

SUBJECT Enerkem Facility Update

ISSUE SUMMARY

To provide an update on Capital Regional District (CRD) staff discussions with Enerkem regarding suitability of its Integrated Resource Management waste-to-energy technology for the capital region.

BACKGROUND

At the October 21, 2020 meeting, staff provided the Environmental Services Committee with information on the Enerkem waste-to-energy technology that is currently operating at the Alberta Biofuels Demonstration Facility in Edmonton. It was identified that the CRD would need to enter into a non-disclosure agreement to obtain further information about the Enerkem technology, process effectiveness and costs, and staff were directed to do so.

Staff have subsequently met with Enerkem to obtain further information about the technology. A non-disclosure agreement was signed in January 2021, and staff met with an Enerkem representative in early 2021 for a high-level business model discussion.

Enerkem evaluated that the feedstock quantities in the region are not enough for its standard system and, combined with the lack of existing industrial infrastructure nearby, the conditions would not allow the bio-refinery project to be viable.

Strategy 15 of the new Solid Waste Management Plan commits the CRD to continuing to conduct research, investigate and report out on emerging waste management technologies, including alternatives to landfilling, such as Integrated Resource Management and gasification. As the Solid Waste Management Plan is implemented, staff will return to the committee with next steps for further investigation into emerging waste management technologies.

CONCLUSION

Staff have met with representatives from Enerkem who have confirmed that the Capital Regional District's feedstock availability, and level of local industrial activity, make the CRD an unsuitable location for Enerkem technology at this time. Staff continue to research and investigate emerging waste management technologies and will return to the committee for direction regarding next steps for further investigation during implementation of the Solid Waste Management Plan.
