SUBJECT 2022 Operating Surplus

ISSUE SUMMARY

To seek approval to transfer any 2022 operating surplus to the capital reserve fund to meet the February 7, 2023, deadline.

BACKGROUND

For the past several years, SEAPARC has transferred the year-end operating surplus to the capital reserve fund to help fund capital infrastructure projects. It is anticipated there will be an operating surplus for 2022 but the exact figure will not be finalized until early February, as December revenues, payroll accruals, internal interest and other payables are yet to be determined.

There are over \$5.8 million in capital projects and equipment replacement planned for 2023 through 2026. Staff will continue to search for grant opportunities, but without a guarantee of these funds, the planned projects must be funded from reserves or debt borrowing. The balance of the capital and equipment replacement reserve funds are estimated to be \$1.29 million at December 31, 2022.

The balance in the reserve fund relies on contributions as budgeted and is supplemented by surpluses from sinking funds as debt issues expire and operating surpluses occur. Any injection of additional funds to the reserves will help to alleviate a potential capital infrastructure deficit.

ALTERNATIVES

Alternative 1

That the Sooke & Electoral Area Parks and Recreation Commission approve the transfer of 50% of the 2022 operating surplus to the capital reserve and 50% of the operating surplus to the equipment replacement fund.

Alternative 2

That the Sooke & Electoral Area Parks and Recreation Commission not approve the transfer of the 2022 operating surplus to the capital reserve and the equipment replacement fund.

IMPLICATIONS

Financial & Service Delivery Implications

Transferring operating surplus to the capital reserves helps to provide an additional source of funding to the reserve. Reserves are necessary to ensure the long-term sustainability of infrastructure, to help match grant funding for large capital projects and to be available in cases of unscheduled emergency replacement of major equipment or infrastructure.

Transferring operating surplus to the equipment replacement fund helps to provide an additional

source of funding to ensure the long-term sustainability of equipment replacements. We do not currently have enough planned funds in the equipment replacement fund to replace our ice resurfacer in 2025 as it reaches end of life.

Carrying forward operating surplus into the next year's operations, and reducing requisition by the same, causes fluctuations on tax requisition, takes away funds from the capital reserves and encourages spending of operating funds at year-end so as not to 'lose' the surplus.

Applying the surplus towards debt is not an option available for long-term debt, except in the event of early debt repayment that may occur at a rate reset date. Generally, a rate reset occurs at the 10-year mark of a loan. SEAPARC's long term debt for the DeMamiel Creek Golf Course is for \$750,000 for a 15 year term with the interest rate reset in 2027. Therefore, the current debt is not eligible for rate resets.

CONCLUSION

The practice of building capital, equipment and operating reserves for funding ongoing infrastructure renewal and to address the continuing uncertainty due to the pandemic is essential to ensuring the long-term sustainability of infrastructure dependent services such as the SEAPARC Leisure Complex. As with all capital reserve funds, the resources to build the proposed reserve funds can either be part of the respective service's budget or result from an operating surplus. It is common for operations with large capital assets to allocate operating surplus to their capital reserves. Historically, the Commission has followed this practice.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Sooke & Electoral Area Parks and Recreation Commission approve the transfer of 50% of the 2022 operating surplus to the capital reserve and 50% to the equipment replacement fund.

SUBJECT Capital Project Update – Arena Chiller

ISSUE SUMMARY

This report is to inform the Commission of the estimated timeline for the arena chiller project.

BACKGROUND

The arena chiller is 20 years old and is scheduled for replacement. The replacement project was approved in the 2022 SEAPARC budget as a capital item with a project cost of \$85,000.

As part of the 2023 budget process staff reviewed the chiller project and some additional considerations.

- Moving from a tube and shell chiller to a plate and frame chiller would result in a smaller ammonia charge in the facility as well as more workspace in the ammonia plant room for staff. Both of these advantages create a safer workspace for staff and safer facility for the public, however the cost of a plate and frame chiller is slightly higher than the originally budgeted tube and shell chiller.
- A recent risk assessment of the facility noted that there are ammonia lines that run
 through the Zamboni bay in the arena. It is recommended that these lines are rerouted
 to the roof of the facility to mitigate the current safety risk as an accidental impact from
 the Zamboni or earthquake would result in an uncontrolled ammonia leak within the
 arena
- Costs for supplies and labour have increased significantly due to inflation and labour shortages.

With these considerations, the capital project for the chiller was adjusted to include the rerouting of the ammonia lines and is now estimated at \$175,000. The updated project was approved by the Commission for the 2023 capital budget and was given preliminary approval by the CRD Board.

The chiller is approaching end of life and is a priority for replacement. The current supply chain shortages currently estimate upwards of 30 weeks for delivery of a new chiller, which will strain the timeline to complete the work during our dryfloor season without disruption to the annual Sooke Fine Arts show. Capital projects do not typically start until after CRD Board final budget approval in March but given that the project was approved in the 2022 budget and that preliminary approval for the price increase is in place, staff are working to gather the required information and specifications to put together a scope of work for the tender documents to be published in January 2023. The award of tender is slated for February/March for a July installation (pending delivery). A quick turnaround for the design by the consultant is a requirement and will be part of the tender.

IMPLICATIONS

Financial Implications

This project will be funded by the capital reserves and is budgeted at \$175,000.

Regulatory Implications

Technical Safety BC oversees the design, construction, installation, and operation of refrigeration equipment throughout British Columbia. Since to the ammonia incident in Fernie, BC, there has been increased regulation of refrigeration plants and a focus on ensuring equipment is in good working order to ensure the safety of staff and public.

CONCLUSION

The arena chiller is due for replacement in 2023. Staff will be starting this project in January to make every effort to complete the project in the scheduled year.

As we currently don't have any grant funding specifically for our Island programs and initiatives we are asking for free access to work with targeted youth Monday to Friday until the end of the school year at SEAPARC. We currently have 4-6 youth in the program as we just started two weeks ago, but have the capacity to support up to 30 school referred youth.
