# SUBJECT SSI Kanaka Skatepark Expansion Proposal

# **ISSUE**

To review implications with a proposed expansion to the Kanaka Skateboard Park.

# **BACKGROUND**

The current Kanaka Skateboard Park was constructed in 2004 in partnership with the Salt Spring Island (SSI) Lions Club and is located on School District 64 (SD64) property. The Capital Regional District (CRD) operates and maintains the skatepark through a license agreement between SD64 and the CRD. The CRD is responsible for maintenance and bookings outside of school hours. SD64 is responsible for maintenance and use during school hours. The CRD owns the asset and is responsible for asset management and capital repairs.

A delegation representing the SSI Skate Park Society (SPS) made a presentation to the SSI Local Community Commission (LCC) on June 13<sup>th</sup>, 2024, requesting approval to expand the existing skatepark (Appendix A). The request was referred to staff for additional information.

Prior to the SSI SPS presenting to the LCC the proposal was first presented to the SD64 Board of Trustees on April 10<sup>th</sup> 2024, where the following motion was passed.

Moved and seconded that the Board of Education approve, in principle, the expansion of the skate park.

CARRIED 14/24

While SD64 supports the proposal in principle it would be the responsibility of the CRD to draft agreements and manage the project through a Design and Construction Management and Operation License as well as a new Operating License Agreement between SD64 and the CRD for the project to proceed.

There are currently 13 active capital projects in the SSI parks and recreation department alone. This does not include the Peace Park Story Memorial Corridor that was recently approved to proceed by the LCC. A Design and Construction Management and Operation License was recently drafted between SD64 and CRD to complete upgrades to the Hydrofield following a substantial donation. The construction portion of the Hydrofield upgrade project has not yet been initiated and would need to be prioritized ahead of any new capital works.

SSI SPS has indicated they would raise funds and make on payment to the CRD for the project to be initiated. CRD oversight including project management, contract negotiations, procurement and administrative support would also be needed. The ongoing operation and management of the facility would also fall to the CRD and may require additional funding and or staff support.

That staff include the Kanaka Skateboard Park expansion project in the 2025 SSI Parks and Recreation Five Year Financial Plan and allocates \$5,000 of Capital Reserve Funding to support a portion of CRD staff administration costs associated with the project.

# Alternative 2

That the report be referred to staff for additional information.

# **IMPLICATIONS**

#### Financial Implications

SSI SPS has submitted a design and construction budget of \$357,000 (Appendix B). In addition to these costs the CRD would be recommending that a contingency and administrative costs be added to the project budget.

SSI SPS has indicated that there is financial support from multiple local business and potentially the SSI Lions Club who provided \$100,000 of funding toward the original skateboard park project in 2004.

# **CONCLUSION**

SSI SPS is requesting LCC approval to expand the existing Kanaka Skateboard Park. SD64 owns the property and has indicated support in principle. Should the project proceed SD64 and the CRD would need to enter into formal construction and operational agreements. SSI SPS has indicated there is financial support to move the project ahead but would still need to fundraise.

The CRD would need to prioritize this project following a number of time sensitive projects that are already underway. The LCC would need to approve initial funding to support staff costs associated with license agreements and initiating the project.

# **RECOMMENDATION**

That the Salt Spring Island Local Community Commission approves that staff include the Kanaka Skateboard Park expansion project in the 2025 SSI Parks and Recreation Five Year Financial Plan and allocates \$5,000 of Capital Reserve Funding to support a portion of CRD staff administration costs associated with the project.

# PROJECT DESCRIPTION

# **ISSUE**

To review one Grant-in-Aid application submission for the Salt Spring Island Electoral Area.

# **BACKGROUND**

The Supplementary Letters Patent for Grant-In-Aid (GIA) requires Capital Regional District (CRD) approval be obtained before any payments for GIA are made on behalf of one or more-member electoral areas to any organization deemed to be contributing to the general interests and advantage of the area.

This service covers the Electoral Areas (EA). Before exercising the powers described above, the Supplementary Letters Patent requires that the Salt Spring Island (SSI) Local Community Commission (LCC) obtain the written approval of the Director of each EA to the proposed GIA for such EA.

In 2023 the LCC directed that two intakes should occur in 2024. One intake to occur in spring, and another in the fall for any remaining funds. This application was brought forward of the fall intake due to exceptional financial and time constraints facing the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce that threatened the viability of their proposed project.

# **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

# Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce

The purpose of this application is to request \$5,000 for third annual Convergence Festival – a free, one-day, family friendly event that brings the community together, highlights local music talent and transforms a parking lot into a vibrant community gathering. The applicant provided a 2024 Convergence Budget, Convergence Parking Lot Festival 2024 Proposal, and Financial Statements for the Fiscal Year 2023.

# **Convergence 2024**

Convergence Festival takes place at the location where the *inter*-island tidal river reaches the Ganges harbour. This is a location where wildly diverse and rich ecological life converges - hence the dual meaning of the event name. The day-long event is a free, family friendly festival that encourages our local community to gather and connect after the bustle of the tourism season subsides. The first two Convergence Festival were fully funded by Mateada and aimed to:

- Bring members of our community together, without financial barriers;
- Showcase the incredible SSI talent *and* bring in world-class culture and performances;
- Turn a parking lot into an Open Pedestrian Gathering Place.

As Mataeda Lounge shifts its business focus this season, plans for Convergence Festival 2024 are scaled down, and require a stronger need for local financial support.

This year's event will maintain the above aims, placing a much larger emphasis on presenting local talent (acts include Small Town Artillery Collective, Drama Queen, The Dang Package, etc.). The festival site will be smaller than previous years, utilizing just the parking area outside Mateada, thereby creating less parking disruption for other surrounding businesses (see site map attached). In addition to live music throughout the day, there will be food for purchase, and Mateada Lounger will provide a licensed area (with appropriate security). There will also be space for local cultural organizations to showcase their activities.

# **Community Supporters**

Salt Spring Arts (SSA) and the Salt Spring Chamber of Commerce (CoC) continue a new era of collaboration, most recently exploring strategies to enhance local event capacity. With the demonstrated success of the first two Convergence festivals, SSA and CoC recognize the opportunity to back Convergence 2024 with fiduciary and logistical support.

# **About: About Tommy van Duersen, Event Producer**

Tommy has been Mateada's Artistic Director for the past 3 years, curating and presenting a full-time music program (12 - 15 shows per month) since March 2022 and bringing a wide variety of music and art to the downtown core. In that role, Tommy also produced 2 community parking lot events, known as Convergence Festival, in the Creekside parking lot (Barb's / Mateada / SS Coffee). #### SUBJECT Financial Plan Amendments to the SSI Parks and Recreation Service

# **ISSUE**

Additional funding is needed to close out two projects under the Salt Spring Island (SSI) Parks and Recreation Service.

# **BACKGROUND**

Funding was allocated in the SSI Parks and Recreation capital plan to support the replacement of the electrical system at the Rainbow Recreation Centre and for annual capital repairs to the building. Project (20-02) Rainbow Electrical System \$529,700 and project (18-01) Pool Building Capital Repairs \$51,000 were set up in 2020 and 2018 and have had annual contributions to support planned works.

A portion of funding allocated to the electrical system was used to replace failing infrastructure including piping discovered when the existing electrical equipment was removed. A portable generator not included in the original scope was also required to keep the main circulation pump in operation during the extended power outage. The additional works have resulted in a project overrun of \$42,506.

Funding allocated for pool building capital repairs was used to assess the building envelope, develop designs and cost out repairs. These works were not fully scoped out as the extent of the damage to the building envelope was unknown. These necessary assessments have resulted in a project overrun of \$16,023.

Community Works Funding (CWF) in the amount of \$428,400 has been allocated to the electrical system project. An additional \$42,506 has been committed to fully fund and close the project out. An additional \$16,023 will need to be allocated from capital reserve funding to support the pool building assessment costs.

# **ALTERNATIVES**

That the Salt Spring Island Local Community Commission recommends to the Capital Regional District Board

#### Alternative 1

- To amend the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Service 2024 Capital Plan by including the \$307,981 "capital on hand" carry forward from 2023 for Project (20-02) Rainbow Road Electrical System in the capital plan and increasing its budget by \$42,506 to be funded from Community Works Fund, resulting in the total project budget from \$529,700 to 572,206.
- To amend the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Service 2024 Capital Plan by including Project (18-01) Pool Building Capital Repairs in the capital plan with \$37,058 "capital on hand" carry forward from 2023 and increasing its budget by \$16,023 to be funded from Capital Reserve, resulting in the total project budget from \$51,000 to 67,023.

# **IMPLICATIONS**

# Financial Implications

The estimated 2024 ending balance of the Pool Capital Reserve Fund (CRF) is \$107,907. Allocating \$16,023 of additional reserve funding towards project (18-01) will result in a year-end balance of \$91,884

Additional CWF funding of 42,506 will be applied towards project (20-02) to fully fund and close out the project.

# **CONCLUSION**

A financial plan amendment is required to allocate additional funding to close out two projects under the SSI Parks and Recreation Service. Allocating additional CWF towards these projects will still require additional CRF to close out these projects.
