# 3. CHAIR'S REMARKS

The Chair made the following remarks:

 Gratitude to Capital Regional District (CRD) and everyone involved in bringing the Anson Road Dock project to completion. This project was an example of achievement, collaborating with CRD and an impressive piece of infrastructure to be proud of. There was a lot learned from the project. It will see lots of use and serious appreciation from the community.

# 4. PRESENTATIONS/DELEGATIONS

There were no presentations or delegations.

## 5. COMMISSION BUSINESS

# 5.1. Capital Project Status Reports and Operations Update – September 2022

Staff provided a summary of the project updates and noted the following additional information:

- Anson Road: Primarily completed. Deficiency walk scheduled for October 12. Public access is restricted until the deficiency walk is completed. Wharfinger to request boats to undock. One change within budget aluminium transition plate for the dock approach to make it more accessible. Existing mini-mesh float by Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) has to be kept as a dinghy dock.
- Retreat Cove: No major progress/decision until the completion of the formal 2023 underwater inspection.
- O Horton Bay: Permit required from DFO for demolition. Staff to start conversation with DFO with an expectation of 6-month turn-around time. Closed sign to be installed at the dock. Plan to close access to the public by end of year. Requests from the community to keep it opened until June, but budget is not available to address failing components. Community willing to do necessary minor upgrades and repairs at no cost to CRD. On-going conversation with non-profit and community to find alternative arrangement to keep the dock opened.
- Spanish Hills: Pacific Industrial & Marine Ltd. (PIM) was awarded the contract and has started the work with installation expected to happen by October/November this year. Floats to be there in two weeks.
- Miners Bay: Operation crew flagged top decking as a concern. Quotes being obtained. Holes on the main wharfhead and the approach patched with plywood as a temporary fix, need permanent solution. Funding not there for the magnitude of the necessary works. Report determined that the gas line is not a hazard. PIM provide unofficial pricing to remove the gas line of approximately \$10,000. Jordison was on-site to check the interior bolts. Bolts were not accessible from the top. Rub boards had to be removed to tighten the bolts. Conclusion of BC Ferries and CRD engineers, shortening dock is not recommended as current length and design has a dampening effect.
- Port Washington: DFO reviewing submission and staff expecting to hear back within the next couple weeks regarding the litigation requirement for land dock. Rotten notice board in need of replacement or refurbishment.
- Piers Island Float: New approach of the extension of single pile instead of three piles. Approval declined by First Nations through the Province due to concern of interference with traditional fishing. Staff are initiating direct conversation with the Cowichan Tribe. Possible on-site meeting and discussion to mitigate concerns. Contract with PIM on-hold.
- Hope Bay/Swartz Bay: Anticipated completion December/January. New dock for Swartz Bay being built off-site and will be stalled early November. Refurbished old dock from Swartz Bay to be moved to Hope Bay. No firm timeline for refurbished

dock being installed at Hope until the scope of refurbishment is determined.

Staff provided a summary of operational updates:

- o Montague Harbour, Galiano Island:
  - UHMW to be picked up today and estimated completion within a week
- Retreat Cove/Sturdies Bay, Galiano Island:
  - Gangways bearings greased 50%, rest are inaccessible
- Port Browning, Pender Island:
  - Floatation failing again
- o Miners Bay, Mayne island:
  - Emergency ladders need replacement
- Hope Bay, Mayne Island:
  - Emergency ladders need replacement
- Powerwashing list in order of priorities

#### Actions:

- Staff to distinguish level of safety hazard/urgency of the deficiency for Anson Road Dock walk-through
- Staff to add a blockade (bench) at Anson Road Dock to prevent vehicles driving down the approach
- Staff to continue looking for alternative transition plan for Horton Bay
- o Staff to determine cost and scoop of bolts-tightening program for Miners Bay
- Staff to add replacement and refurbishment of notice boards to next year budget.

The Project and Operations update report was received for information.

# SUBJECT Southern Gulf Islands Harbours Service 2023 Operating and Capital Budget

# **ISSUE SUMMARY**

To present the 2023 Southern Gulf Islands Harbours Service Operating and Capital Budget and to highlight the changes from the 2022 budget and the proposed 2022 budget figures.

# **BACKGROUND**

The Capital Regional District (CRD) is required by legislation under the Local Government Act (LGA) to prepare an annual Operating and Capital budget and a five-year Financial Plan. CRD staff have prepared the budget and financial plan shown in Appendix A for the Southern Gulf Islands Harbours Service.

The Operating Budget includes the regular annual costs to operate the service. The Capital Expenditure Plan shows the anticipated expenditures for capital projects. These may include purchases of new assets or infrastructure, upgrades or improvements to existing assets or asset review, and study work potentially leading to future capital improvements.

The 2023 budget has been prepared considering:

- 1. Actual expenditures incurred between 2020 and 2022
- 2. Anticipated changes in level of service (if any)
- 3. Maximum allowable tax requisition
- 4. Annual Cost per parcel

Factors considered in the preparation of the Capital Expenditure Plan included:

- 1. Available funds on hand
- 2. Projects already in progress
- 3. Condition of existing assets and infrastructure
- 4. Regulatory, environmental, and health and safety factors

Adjustments for surpluses or deficits from 2022 may be made in January 2023. The CRD Board will give approval to the budget and financial plan in March 2023.

The Financial Plan for the years 2024 to 2027 may be subject to change in future years.

## **BUDGET OVERVIEW**

## Operating Budget

It is projected that operating expenses in 2022 for the Harbours management and dock operations will be approximately \$50,649 under budget primarily due to lower repair and maintenance costs and lower wharfinger compensation and travel costs.

The lower wharfinger compensation costs are directly related to lower anticipated moorage revenue for the service. Wharfinger compensation is one half of the moorage revenue collected for each dock.

The debt servicing costs will be approximately \$4,028 over budget as the result of higher than budgeted interest rates on \$1,180,000 of new long-term Municipal Finance Authority (MFA) borrowing in 2022 undertaken through Loan Authorization Bylaw No. 4408.

It is projected that 2022 operating revenue, which includes moorage revenue and licensing fees, will be approximately \$38,740 under budget. Lower revenue is primarily related to the Anson Dock Facility lower operating revenue because of the facility beginning operations later in the year.

As a result, there is a net operating surplus of \$7,881. To balance the 2022 operating budget, it is proposed that the operating surplus be transferred to the Capital Reserve Fund (CRF).

# 2023 Operating and Capital Expense and Revenue Budget

The 2023 over 2022 harbours management operating budget has been increased by \$11,024 (18.1%). The increase is primarily to account for inflation and an \$8,600 ongoing cost for labour allocation to provide additional administration oversight for the service.

The 2023 over 2022 harbours dock operating expense budget has been decreased by \$14,390 (-7.7%). The decrease is primarily due to:

- Reduction in operating costs for Anson Road dock on Mayne Island. The 2022 budget for Anson Road Dock included a one-time cost of \$14,500 for start-up costs which included significant public communications and administration related to expression of interest for moorage issued to the local community.
- Although decommissioning of the Horton Bay Dock is in the service's five-year capital
  plan currently scheduled in 2023, operating costs will continue for part of 2023 until such
  time as the dock is fully decommissioned or alternative continuing operating options are
  considered for this facility.

This results in an overall combined net decrease in the 2023 operating budget of approximately \$3,366 (-1.4%).

# Municipal Finance Authority (MFA) Debt

Loan Authorization Bylaw 4408 (LA4408) was approved and adopted in 2021 to borrow up to \$1,180,000 for the planning, study, equipment purchase, and construction of works related to the provision of small craft harbour facilities. Table 1 below summarizes the detailed information for existing MFA debt related to LA4408.

# Capital Reserve Fund

The capital reserve fund is to be used to pay for capital expenditures that are not funded by other sources such as grants, divestiture payments, operating budget, or debt.

It is proposed that the 2023 Capital Reserve Fund (CRF) transfer be set at \$129,136 in 2023. The reserve fund transfer planning is influenced by the funding required to support the five-year capital expenditure plan, the emergency response to infrastructure failures and guided by *Capital Reserve Funding Guidelines* endorsed by the CRD Board in aiming to achieve the optimal reserve fund level to ensure long-term prudent and sustainable management of service delivery objectives through capital investments.

A total of \$450,000 will be required from the capital reserve over the next five years to support the capital expenditure plan. The CRF balance at the end of 2022 is projected to be \$171,810.

# Capital Expenditure Plan

The 5-year 2023 to 2027 capital plan includes \$896,000 of expenditures to be funded by a combination of capital reserve fund, grant funding, and capital funds on hand. The Horton Bay decommissioning (19-03) is budgeted for \$80,000 and will be funded by capital on hand. Retreat Cove (19-02) renewal is budgeted for \$179,000 in 2024 however CRD will be pursuing subsequent dock inspections in advance and prior to procuring. Concerns have recently been raised about deterioration of the top side decking on the Miners Bay dock that will be reviewed with the intention of accessing grant money to complete. The Annual Provisional amount (21-03) has been increased to \$100,000 for 2023 with the anticipation that some unforeseen projects could be identified during the dock inspections.

# Capital Projects Fund

As specific capital projects are approved, the funding revenues for them are transferred into the Capital Project Fund from multiple possible funding sources as applicable, including CRF, grant funding, external contributions, and debt. Any funds remaining upon completion of a project are transferred back to the CRF for use on future capital projects or to its original non-CRF funding sources if required.

# Parcel Tax

The service is funded by parcel taxes, moorage, and licensing fees. All properties within the local service area are responsible for the parcel tax. Table 2 below summarizes the 2023 over 2022 changes for parcel tax.

Users of the service pay dock moorage and licensing fees; the fee revenue budget for 2023 is \$145,050, an increase of \$3,810 (2.7%) from 2022.

Service: 1.235 SGI Small Craft Harbour Facilities Committee: Electoral Area

#### **DEFINITION:**

A local service, established by Bylaw No. 2614, October 6, 1998, in the Southern Gulf Islands Electoral Area to establish, acquire and operate a service of small craft harbour facilities.

#### SERVICE DESCRIPTION:

The SGI Small Craft Harbour Facilities service funds and operates 12 small craft harbour facilities in the Southern Gulf Islands. The docks are located on Mayne, Galiano, North and South Pender, Saturna, Piers and Vancouver Islands. The service was undertaken by the CRD upon the Federal Government of Canada's divestiture of ownership and operation of small craft harbour facilities. The Federal Government provided 1-time funding of \$1.6 million to the CRD for dock rehabilitation. The service is administered by the Southern Gulf Islands Harbour Commission.

#### **MAXIMUM LEVY:**

Greater of \$112,878 or \$0.10 / \$1,000 of actual assessed value of land and improvements. To a maximum of \$477,519.

#### **COMMISSION:**

Southern Gulf Islands Harbour Commission as established by Bylaw No. 2972 in 2002.

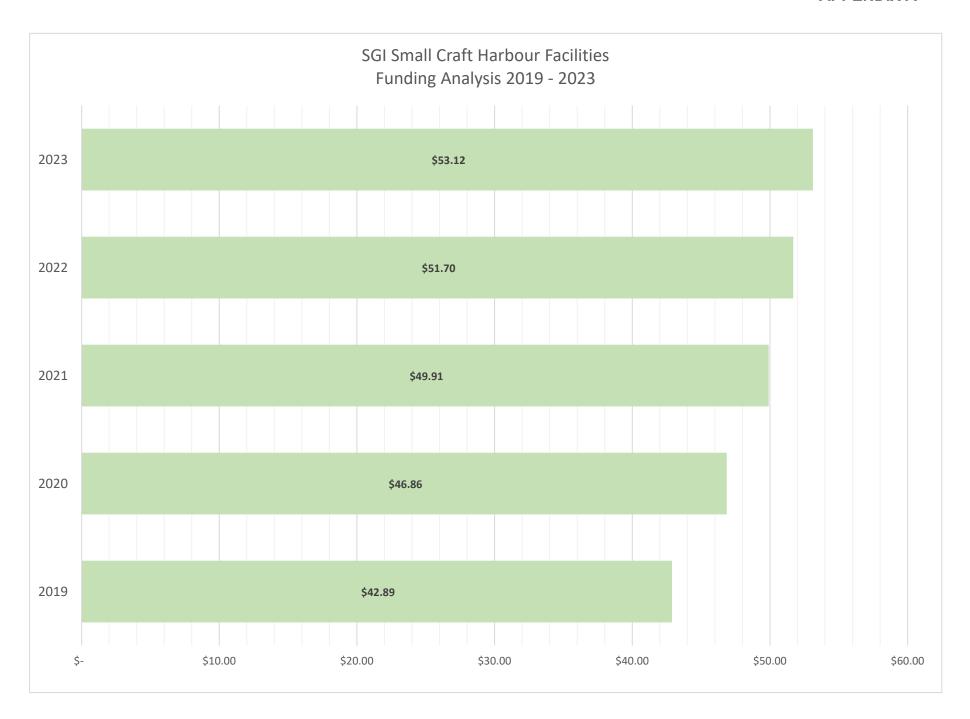

# **SUBJECT** Southern Gulf Islands Harbours Projects and Operations Update – November 2022

# **ISSUE SUMMARY**

To provide the Southern Gulf Islands Harbours Commission with capital project status reports and operational updates.

## **BACKGROUND**

The Southern Gulf Islands Harbours (SGIH) service area is comprised of 13 dock facilities among five islands within the Southern Gulf Islands including the addition of the Anson Road Dock. Through the service's five-year capital plan, the Capital Regional District (CRD) executes capital projects to maintain the level of service, improve service, and conduct major repairs.

# **CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATE**

# 19-01 | Anson Road

Project Description: Construction of the Anson Road facility - gravel roadway, approach, main float and approximately 720 feet (ft.) of moorage.

Project Rationale: This project is for construction of the Anson Road facility, including gravel parking lot, retaining wall, dock approach, main floats and approximately 720 ft. of moorage. Funding is a combination of Capital Reserves, funding from Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) and debt borrowing.

## Project Update and Milestones:

 Pacific Industrial & Marine Ltd. (PIM) has completed construction except for minor scope items to be completed. The dock opened November 1.

Recommended works include repairs to the approach piles, and repairs to the floats.

## Project Update and Milestones:

- Further investigation in the existing condition has staff determining that this project can be deferred until after the 2023 inspections. This has been confirmed with the Wharfinger Coordinator and Galiano Island's Commission member.
- Funds were used in April 2022 for flotation repair, in the amount of \$4,869.50 with remainder to be returned to the Capital Reserve Fund (CRF) until 2024.

## 20-02 | Spanish Hills

Recommended works include preventative maintenance works on piles to extend service life, replace broken pile footing and replacement of the gangway and float. Funding is required for staff to retain a contractor to carry out the works.

- A RFQ was issued the week of March 14, 2022 to three qualified contractors as per CRD's procurement policy.
- Contract was awarded with PIM.
- Inspection with contractor May 25, 2022 to review the scope of work. Work alterations to tender include approach works eliminated and wharfhead works to include pedestrian railings around two sides. Float to be narrower as per DFO small docks specifications.

# 20-04 | Miners Bay Upgrades

Project Description: Upgrades to the Miners Bay wharfhead and approach upgrades.

Project Rationale: Additional works were highlighted during the completion of the 2018 upgrade works including the requirement to replace the wharfhead decking, need to replace the electrical system and lighting, repairs and replacements for rails on the approach and additional piles requiring replacement. A grant application was submitted and unsuccessful in 2020, funding through borrowing is required.

# Project Update and Milestones:

- Scope of works in development for improvements, in consultation with Wharfinger Coordinator.
- The gas line work was deferred due to budget constraints.
- Initial discussions with Moffatt & Nichol on design considerations for the float realignment have concluded and it was recommended not to alter the float.
- Staff have had some initial discussions with BC Ferries.
- Contractors contacted to provide quotes for three scenarios:
  - o replace the decking on the wharfhead and part of the approach with new decking;
  - o replace part of the decking and place a barrier approximately ten feet into the wharfhead to stop people from entering onto the remaining wharfhead; or
  - o replace part of the decking up to ten feet into the wharfhead and then demolition the rest of the wharfhead.
- The prices received were over-budget and a re-scoping of the works has been initiated.
- Grant funding will be pursued.

- (UHMW) sheets in pile wells, replace rub boards, and install rub boards.
- A RFQ was issued the week of March 21, 2022 to three qualified contractors as per CRD's procurement policy.
- Upon RFQ award, an on-site meeting will be conducted with the successful proponent, wharfinger, Wharfinger Coordinator, and local Commission member to review scope in the event conditions changed from scope development.
- Two submissions received from the RFQ, both were over budget. Staff re-prioritized the work and the lowest proponent, PIM, was able to price the works within the available budget.
- Inspection with contractor May 25, 2022 to review the scope of work. Work alterations to tender include approach and wharfhead works eliminated, installation of refurbished float from Swartz Bay, gangway works to remain and provisional items eliminated.
- Work timing depends on the construction of new float for Swartz Bay.

Project Description: Dock improvements outlined from the 18-01 Inspection project with dock replacement happening in 2022.

Project Rationale: This project includes works to maintain the current level of service as recommended in Stantec's 2018 inspection. Recommended works include approach decking, bull rail, and handrail repair and replacements, float and gangway repairs. Funds are required for staff to retain a contractor to carry out the works. In 2020 it was noted that Float B had rotting frame indicating requirement to replace the float.

- Scope of work confirmed with the Wharfinger Coordinator, works to include float replacement, gangway repairs including painting, add transition plate, replace roller bearings and hinges, and paint approach guardrail.
- A RFQ was issued for replacement of the float in March 2022.

- Inspection with contractor May 25, 2022 to review the scope of work. Work alterations to tender include float larger than on the drawings (increase in cost) and provisional works eliminated.
- Work scheduled to be completed December 2022.
